The new Center for European Studies (CES) housed within the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences (CLAS) at the University of Florida (UF) is a Title VI National Resource Center funded in part by the US Department of Education, with significant contributions from the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, the Division of Sponsored Research and the Office of the Provost. The primary goal of the new CES is to serve as an organizational hub for the myriad of activities already occurring across the campus related to the study of Europe broadly defined. To this end the CES will act to facilitate activities within and between diverse centers and assist in the development of new interdisciplinary programs, courses and events. The CES will pursue its goals through a number of diverse outlets that

promote faculty and student development as well as significant outreach to the broader Gainesville and Florida community. The CES will also be working with the UF Smathers Library to expand our current holdings related to Europe, with particular emphasis on foreign language resources, and with the Tandberg Language Lab (Turlington Hall) to expand our European language resources.

Announcing the European Union Studies Minor

The CES is offering an European Union (EU) Studies Minor to all UF undergraduates beginning in Spring of 2004. Completion of the minor will require 18 hours of course work in addition to participation in either an EU related internship or an EUSP approved study abroad program, currently including the Brussels, Prague and the Salzburg summer abroad programs. The minor will offer students a chance to study the EU across a wide array of disciplines, including business, sociology, political science, history, and foreign languages. These grants are designed to assist UF graduate students with travel to Europe to pursue intensive language study, dissertation research, or to present a work at a scholarly conference or workshop. The original deadline of January 1st, 2004 has been extended to January 31st.

Summer Study Abroad Grants for Undergraduate Students: The Center for European Studies (CES) in conjunction with the European Union Studies Program (EUSP) will be offering three \$500 grants to undergraduate students participating in one of the EUSP approved summer programs: Brussels (VUB), Salzburg, and the Prague (Charles University). To be eligible for this

grant students must apply to participate in one of these programs and enroll in the relevant EU related course within the program. All grants will be made tentative to the fulfillment of these requirements. Deadline for applications is March 2nd. Applications should be submitted using the form available on the CES website or from the CES main office in 3340 Turlington.

Mr. Kostopoulos has a BA in Classical philology from the University of Ioannina-Greece and an MA in Classics from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where he is also completing his Ph.D. His research interests are diverse and range from the role of astrology and related sciences in the formation of various political and social ideologies in the Greco-Roman world to various aspects of Greek and Roman history and civilization. He taught courses on

Latin as well as Greek language, Literature

and the Arts, and Classical Studies at the University of Wisconsin, and he served for many years as treasurer and secretary of the Hellenic Students Association of UW-Madison. At UF he is teaching courses on Greek language and literature (GRK 1131 and GRK 4300) as well as a course that examines the relationship between Greek culture and the formation of a new European identity (CLAS 3930).

Scholar's Corner



Kelli Moore, is a Ph.D. student in Comparative Politics and International Relations. She plans to travel to England to conduct research for her dissertation on urban riots between Asians (specifically from the Indian subcontinent) and whites during the summer of 2001. Her study examines the causes behind race riots in English cities like Oldham and Blackburn and the reasons for their prevention in Leicester and Luton, arguing that the answer lies in the behavior of civic organizations. Moore believes this project

is crucial not only to England, but to Europe as a whole as it faces immigration from countries that are racially, ethnically, and religiously different and, simultaneously, a growing wave of xenophobia and right-wing extremism. She hopes that her study will produce generalizable results that academics, practitioners, and local communities can use to prevent ethnic and racial conflicts not only in Europe but across the globe.

J. Scott Parker, a senior majoring in Film and French, is currently working on a thesis that explores portrayals of 2nd and 3rd generation North Africans in mid-90s French *banlieue* films. *Banlieue* films capture the essence of social problems that run through French working class suburbs, presenting recourse to drugs, violence, and anti-social behavior as a natural result of limited social mobility for North African and other immigrants. In this way, Parker argues, films such as *La Haine, Bye Bye, Hexagone* and *Rai* counter the



negative stereotypes of North Africans. More broadly, they engage with current redefinitions of French national identity with respect to its colonial past, highlighting France's slow acceptance of cultural influences from former colonies as enriching rather than threatening.

The Summer Study Abroad at Vesalius College, VUB in Brussels Belgium: The Vesalius College is an English language international college within the Dutch speaking BelgianVrije Universiteit Brussel (VUB). The Summer in Brussels Program is part of the EU Studies Certificate/Minor program but is open to all interested students. The program is focused to a certain extent on the European Union and unless previously discussed and approved by the director all students must take POL 334-Current Issues in the Development of the EU (3 units). Program costs include: UF international Center administrative fee, MEDEX insurance, tuition

The Salzburg Study Abroad Program: This program is perfect for History and Political Science majors, and those students who want to complete the introductory German language sequence (equivalent to GER 1122) and all other students interested in taking the following courses: "Modern Europe," "Economics & Politics of the European Union*," or "Beginning German III." Approximate cost: \$3,800, which includes: housing in Austrian homes with an Austrian family (one or two students per home), all meals in Salzburg (breakfast and dinner in the homes, lunch at Salzburg College), a 4day field trip to Vienna (hotel room, breakfast, events), special events (walking tours, day trips, Palace tours, etc.), all UF International Center fees, and six hours of transfer credit (2

The Prague Summer Study Abroad Program: UF students will be studying at the Charles University's Institute for Language and Preparatory Studies (ILPS), located near the mythenveloped Vysehrad (a raised settlement that predates Prague and has a magnificent view of the river and Prague Castle). Prior knowledge of the Czech language is **NOT** required. The Prague Summer Program is a language and culture program combined with an in-country cultural experience. Students are required to take conversational Czech taught by ILPS faculty at all levels, and a culture class taught entirely in English by a UF faculty members, Dr. Galina Rylkova and Dr. Amie Kreppel. The program cost will include: tuition, accommodation, study material, local excursions, two field trips, UF International Center application deposit, MEDEX emergency assistance insurance.
