This is a one-unit directed readings course that will focus on the exploration of modern consciousness, following the lead of Marshall Berman's *All that is Solid Melts into Air: The Experience of Modernity*. Berman explores the emergence of modern consciousness, and the dialectic between modernity and modernism, through his close analysis of canonical literary and philosophical texts and urban landscapes. This course will give you a deep insight into the material and spiritual forces that have shaped the modern world.

This is a class based largely on discussion and engagement – this requires that you actually be in class and actively participate. This course will be conducted in seminar format. That means that **each student** is expected to come to **each session** prepared to discuss the readings assigned for **that session**. Any unexcused absence will result in a loss of points.

WEEKLY READING JOURNAL: 50% of your grade

The reading journal (1 page) that you are asked to complete BEFORE THE WEEKLY ZOOM MEETINGS is designed to guide your reading and facilitate discussion.

Reading questions late submission policy: Unless otherwise agreed with the instructor, late submissions will be graded according to the grading rubric.

TWO RESEARCH PROJECTS: 20% +20% =40 % of your grade

You have been assigned 2 short research projects where you will collect additional research material on a city mentioned in the book, an author, novel, poem, or a philosopher. It is up to you which module/reading you do select the do the research, but you are to present this research to your peers during a week that it is relevant. The suggested length is 2-3 pages.
