POL1131 Polish Language and Culture 2

Spring 2024 5 credits In-person section

Course Description

The goal of Polish 1130 and POL1131 is to introduce the student to the Polish language and culture. POL1131 is a continuation of 1130. The two courses together are designed as beginners' experience with the Polish language. Because it is an introductory level course, it is assumed that the student may not have any prior knowledge in the area. However, if a student did not take POL1130, it is expected that he or she can demonstrate proficiency in langue and culture comparable with a student who completed POL1130. Class #25674 (Sec.1PLR)

Course Objectives

Students will be able to:

- use nouns, adjectives and personal pronouns in six of the seven cases
- use the introduced verbs in parent tense, past tense, and future Prefect.
- choose a correct case for the noun when given one of the verbs listed in vocabulary for lesson 11 19
- use the numbs in relation to specific time and weeks, months, years, and quantity of items
- use prepositions with selected cases
- describe at least one of Poland's national parks, one famous castle and at least one Nobel Prize winner with Polish roots



<u>Class Participation and Attendance</u>: A major part of learning any foreign language is its spoken usage. A language does not exist in a vacuum. To that end, 15% of your final grade in Polish 1131 will be determined by your attendance and participation in the classroom.

<u>Quizzes and Homework:</u> Each new topic/week has a spelling quiz, homework assignments, and a weekly quiz. Homework is assigned to help you practice the material before having to take the assessment.

Culture Project

Beginning in the 3rd week of class you will choose a general subject on Polish culture. I will need to approve your choice before you begin work. Each week (on Monday) you will submit on Canvas a 1-page, double spaced report on what new you've discovered on this subject. At the end of the semester, you will synthesize these reports and give 12-15 min presentation.

<u>Reading and Writing Weekly Assignments</u>: These assignments are not part of your book and are only thematically related to textbook lessons. This group of assessments is designed to help you practice a different set of skills that are also important in developing language proficiency.

<u>Exams</u>: There are three tests during the semester. Each will cover only the most recent material (3 book lessons). Unless I am notified in advance, or it is a documented emergency you cannot make up an exam that you miss due to an absence.

<u>Final Exam</u>: The final exam will be cumulative, covering everything we will have studied by then. Unless I am notified in advance, or it is a documented emergency you cannot make up the final that you miss due to an absence.

In-Class Recording
