Course Description:

The 5-credit Beginning Hungarian 1 an introductory course that familiarizes students with basic patterns and structures of Hungarian language using mostly Present Tense (Past and Future tenses are covered in HNG 1131 Beginning Hungarian 2). The course content will include the rich combination of readings, listening and writing that promote both the learning of the pronunciation, spelling, and grammar as well as the use of language.

As a general guideline for online courses, students should plan to dedicate to 2-3 hours of homework per course credit hour. That's 10-15 hours a week for this course.


Course Objectives:

The primary focus of this first semester of Hungarian is to develop students' ability to understand the spoken and written Hungarian and to enable them to express themself in basic situations. Listening comprehension and reading are the bases for the acquisition of a new language. The goal in this course is communicative competence. The online activities will allow students to practice their skills of understanding and interacting in Hungarian.

- Goals for the semester:
- Students will learn Hungarian pronunciation, stress, and basic word order.
- Students will exercise everyday conversations.
- Students will read short stories and prose found in websites, newspapers, and magazines.
- Students will develop understanding of spoken Hungarian by listening to audio and video.
- Students will learn to write short conversations, messages in Hungarian.

At the end of the HNG 1130 students' language knowledge should be on Novice Mid-level (for detailed description check the ACTFL Proficiency Guideline https://www.actfl.org/sites/default/files/guidelines/ACTFLProficiencyGuidelines2012.pdf)

Can you already do this? Consider moving up to another Hungarian class. Students who are heritage speakers must consult with the instructor.

- 5. **Course Communication**: A weekly "To-Do list" will be available on Canvas, with additional clarifications will be sent via announcements every weekend. Please check these regularly. Inquiries sent via UF email or Canvas email will be answered within 24 hours on business days. Weekend inquiries might be addressed only on Monday.
- 6. **Weekly Consultation**: Online students must meet with the instructor via Zoom every Friday or Monday to discuss progress and receive feedback. This is optional for Hybrid students.
- 7. Canvas Assignments' Evaluation: Canvas may sometimes misinterpret your answers in Hungarian. Your instructor will review and adjust scores, providing explanations as needed. If Canvas marks your grade lower, please wait for the instructor to review your work before raising any concerns.
- 8. Late and Make-Up Work: Assignments must be submitted by the due date. If you anticipate any issues, contact the instructor at least 24 hours before the deadline. Make-up work is limited to three times per semester and excludes assessments unless an official petition is submitted.

Class Participation (10%):

Only for hybrid students: Active participation is essential to build your language skills and language proficiency effectively. You are required to attend all scheduled on-campus meetings and actively contribute to class activities. Your preparation involves completing assigned homework by the deadlines and getting ready for in-class vocabulary quizzes, presentations, and memorization tasks. These activities are crucial for practicing the language and deepening your understanding of the material.

Note: I understand that we all have different levels of comfort regarding speaking in class. If you have any issues that prohibit you from participating in class, I encourage you to contact me so I can find ways to make participation work for you in this class.

Only for online students: Online students are expected to complete all assignments, both graded and non-graded, by their respective deadlines, typically by Sunday night. If a deadline falls on a different day, students will be notified through Canvas. Maintaining these deadlines is crucial and will be reflected in the participation grade. Although this is a self-paced course without regular scheduled meetings, students are required to meet with the instructor via Zoom at least once a week for consultation.

Weekly Coursework/Activities (quizzes, exercises, reviews, presentations) (30%):

About 90% of course exercises from the textbooks are available as Canvas Quizzes, organized by week with direct links. Students may use either the paper or digital textbook while completing them. Most are practice quizzes with unlimited attempts, but each week* includes one graded quiz selected from these.

Although quizzes provide instant feedback, **Hungarian language features** are not fully supported by Canvas, so the instructor will **manually review and adjust** as needed.

Vocabulary study will be done through **Quizlet**, with flashcards and activities shared by the instructor. Weekly **graded vocabulary quizzes** will track progress.

Students are also expected to complete Canvas activities, including audio/video recordings, and a graded review test in .docx format.

If a Canvas link is not provided for a task, students must submit their work using a Google Doc link that will be shared by the instructor at the beginning of the semester.

Monthly Tests (Test&Essays&Recordings) (30% >3x10%)

There will be **three tests** during the semester, scheduled for **Weeks 6, 11, and 16**. Each test includes **drills** (such as open-ended or fill-in-the-blank questions), a **short essay**, and a **recorded component** (reading or presentation).

Tests will be posted on Canvas under **Assignments** in two formats: **online** and **.docx download**. Students must inform the instructor of their preferred format **at least 24 hours in advance**.

If you receive a **C- or lower**, you may revise and resubmit your test **once**. If the corrections are acceptable, your grade will increase by **half a letter** (e.g., from C- to B).

Details about each test will be announced on Canvas two weeks in advance.

Final (Course Project - Presentation/Oral Exam) (30%)

In the second half of the semester, students will explore additional topics beyond the textbook. Each week starting from **Week 11**, students will create a **mini-presentation** on one of these topics, along with a **1–2 paragraph transcript** to submit to the instructor.

For the **final presentation**, subtitles should not be included. However, students may use a brief **keyword draft** as a reminder during their talk.

The Oral Exam/Course Project Presentation will be evaluated based on the following criteria:

Written Texts: Content, comprehensibility, and grammar/vocabulary.

Spoken Performance: Pronunciation and fluency.

The Oral Presentation will focus on two major topics, and the instructor may ask questions related to other topics as well.

General Topics for the Final Exam:

Me and My Family: Students may use imaginary information about themselves and their family to practice the language.

- My Best Friend: Students may use imaginary information to describe their best friend.
- Daily Routine
- Living and Working Environment: Describe your home, city, and school.
- Free Time: Discuss seasons, hobbies, food, traveling, etc.
